Parish Jottings

County Councillor Report:

Fiona Whelan told us: Please note her new Email: fewhelan@gmail.com

1. Fiona is currently using bike & bus and writing a blog to highlight rural transport problems and would like to hear of any issues.
2. Completion delays for the Guided Bus have occurred again.
3. Comberton VC is full from year 8 upwards; this highlights insufficient future secondary provision, particularly in view of the housing growth in Cambourne. Councillors were reassured that pupils transferring from Barton to CVC should have no problems until at least 2013; the situation after that is not yet known.
4. Home Meadow day care at Toft has now closed, but respite care continues. Day care is provided elsewhere, if you know of problems, please advise Fiona.
5. There will be a drastic reappraisal of all services in the County Council budget; currently there exists a £9 million shortfall from government sources.

District Councillor Report:

Barton Ward Oil Club is entering its second year and since January, 140 members from the four participating villages have pooled orders of over 200,000 litres of oil through our agent, Jeremy Cole (01954 719 452 or jeremy@agricole.co.uk) who is able to shop around for price and service and obtain volume discounts. The Club is free to join and our agent donates £5 to BRIG and other good causes for every member who buys more than 1,000 litres in a year. Disturbance to residents Our enquiry about loud music being played from Haggis Farm in the early hours of 5th September is being pursued by SCDC Environmental Health; apparently the tenant does have a licence for that type of event.

Play Equipment A replacement child's cradle swing has been ordered. We are aware that the popular zip wire has had some teething troubles, engineers will be coming to adjust the tension soon.

Audit 2009-10 Moore Stephens considers that the annual return is in accordance with the Audit Commission's requirements, in other words we are pleased to have passed again.

Highways:

Issues from the walkabout on 3 August Councillors felt that the village generally looks in good order, much of it due to the efforts of the BeaVers. We are pleased that New Rd has been resurfaced, and especially the nearby pavement. We know the pavements in the High Street are in an atrocious state and keep on reminding the County's Road Supervisor.

A and B road speed limit review Review No.29 A603 + B1042 suggests a 50mph limit from Barton to the city boundary at Newnham. Barton PC suggested a 40mph limit on the A603 up to the M11 roundabout. However CambsCC feels that drivers will not respect such a limit at off-peak times. We have asked Fiona Whelan and Francis Burkitt to help us in our efforts to reduce the limits.

There will be some **roadworks** for Joint Replacement on the A603 motorway bridge in October (Monday-Friday night-time working); diversions will be posted via the M11.

Cycling on footway in New Road Safety issues dictate that the young and elderly might want to cycle along the footway, however pedestrians must be given priority, the signs stressing that are to be reinstated. Please may we ask cyclists too to be more considerate of those on the pavement? We know many culprits are from elsewhere!

Parking outside school in New Rd is often dangerous. Under the "Safer Routes to School" scheme parents are encouraged to find alternative means of transport or to park in High St.

Capping of Parish Councils Lobbying is taking place against this. Although the new government idea may at first appear attractive, the proposals suggest that any increase in village precept could only be sanctioned by a local referendum, the costs of which would be prohibitive for a small, prudent council such as ours.

Barton BeaVers & small works Hay cutting and maintenance have been done in Church Close, as well as some bramble cutting and seat staining in other areas. John Boocock has been doing some sterling work on the car park in School Lane and would always welcome helpers.

Comberton Neighbourhood Panel A public meeting where you have the chance to have your say about issues that affect you. This could include safety issues such as crime, anti-social behaviour, road safety and traffic management, as well as other matters that affect the quality of life in your neighbourhood.

Neighbourhood Watch

Cambridgeshire now has a new Chief Constable, Simon Parr, who comes from Hertfordshire Constabulary, where he was Deputy Chief Constable for three years. He is 49, has 27 years' police service and is committed to providing good frontline services in spite of the tough financial challenges that lie ahead.

Fortunately, reported crime has been relatively low in Barton recently. A notable exception to this was a large number of thefts from tents at the Cambridge Rock Festival in August. In addition, two steel farm gates were stolen from Comberton Road, Barton during August. Also, scrap metal merchants have been seen in the village and there has been a report of a possible theft.

In my experience, the police have been very good in following up reports of possible crimes and at least one crime has been solved as a result of a report to Neighbourhood Watch, so please ensure that all crimes are reported so that they can be logged and followed up.

We have had a number of warnings from the police about distraction burglaries (where a burglar pretending to be from an organisation such as Cambridge Water distracts a householder whilst his accomplice ransacks the property).

Burglary may increase as the nights grow longer and the police offer the following advice:

- * Always keep doors and windows closed and locked or in a ventilated but locked position.
- * Remove keys from window and door locks
- * Never leave items such as keys, bags and money on show through a window, as these can prove a real temptation for an opportunist burglar.
- * Use timer switches to turn on lights and radios when you are going to be away from your house at dusk.
- * Consider the use of lights at the front and rear of your property that are activated when someone approaches.
- * Consider property marking your valuable and sentimental personal possessions with liquid DNA kits such as Smart water, SelectaDNA or with an engraving kit for items such as tools and cycles.

New blue wheelie bin collections will start on 15th October (put the blue and green ones out together). If yours hasn't arrived by 6th October, contact www.scambs.org.uk/bluebin or 03450 450 063.

You may find that the lid doesn't close at first, but it should settle back into shape after a week or so.

There are some changes about what goes in each bin, but there's a guide in the South Cambs magazine and an information pack will come with the blue bin. The main idea is to keep things clean and separate, especially paper, as this makes it more valuable.

If you have more recyclable material than will fit into the blue bin, it can be put in a returnable container (the old green crates are ideal) alongside the bin.
