

**Dear All,**

R.S. Thomas was a Welsh poet and church minister. Born in 1913 he spent most of his working life in rural parishes in North Wales, before retiring in 1978. He died in 2000, leaving behind a legacy of 1,500 poems. Many of these poems explore the hard lives of peasant farmers in North Wales, the landscape and Thomas' relationship with both and with God.

Thomas was a complex character, who was once described by the poet Seamus Heaney as 'a loner taking on the universe, a kind of Clint Eastwood of the spirit'! Yet he wrote with compassion and tenderness about the difficult lives of those he ministered to. His poetry contains glimpses of light and traces of God's glory and peace. This is one such poem:

***The Bright Field***

*Life is not hurrying  
on to a receding future, nor hankering after  
an imagined past. It is the turning  
aside like Moses to the miracle  
of the lit bush, to a brightness  
that seemed as transitory as your youth  
once, but is the eternity that awaits you.*

In our busy lives where information and news can be so easily accessed, perhaps we spend too much time hurrying by. With the promise of spring, we may think about turning aside from our own busyness as Moses did and consider what the changes we see around us and within as we allow God's world to speak.

To turn aside to the small miracles of the everyday that might otherwise pass unnoticed.

## **Parish Jottings**

### **District Councillor Francis Burkitt**

Francis wanted to highlight the Cambridge City Deal, it is an opportunity to obtain £500 million from the government, if the correct conditions are met. It could provide both an exciting and frightening challenge. The liaison involves an executive board of five members – a representative each from the city of Cambridge, business, South Cambs, the County Council and the University – and an assembly of 15 members, of which Francis is one. If the three local authorities

are deemed to plan housing and transport “sensibly” – which means getting houses built and creating jobs, because the Cambridge area is seen as a powerhouse of economic growth – money will accrue from the government. Among priorities would be a bus corridor from Cambourne towards Cambridge. The first concrete plans are due for 2019.

Francis also mentioned that our bin men do not get much praise for their valuable service. Barton councillors therefore unanimously approved a resolution: “This Council wishes to record its gratitude to all the crews, drivers and loaders, and their supervisor and director, for all the hard work they put in collecting all our black, blue and green bin rubbish.”

**The bridge at Grantchester will be closed to vehicles for six months, but a temporary foot/cycle bridge allowing access for pedestrians and cyclists will be in place. This is now due to begin on 2<sup>nd</sup> February.**

***Speed, traffic problems, solutions? Your help?***

So many areas of the village experience problems: the main A603 with speeding and the problems of crossing, difficulties of crossing New Road to access the school, speeding along Comberton Road, the dangers at the New Road/Cambridge Road junction, for instance. Effective means of traffic calming are hard to find; they often have many disadvantages. Is there anyone out there who can help us? Is there someone with traffic or road expertise who can advise? The Council is looking to set up a small working party to look at all traffic problem areas in the village. Initiatives must be worked on and probably funded by the Parish in the first instance so that definite and well researched proposals can then be approved by the County Council. Please advise the Clerk or the Chairman, if you are interested.

***South Cambridge District Council gives you a say in the future of your pubs.***

Both SCDC and The Campaign for Real Ale bring to your attention a public consultation that SCDC is currently holding on the potential use of Article 4 Directions **to prevent pub losses either through change of use or through demolition**. The conversion last year of the Pear Tree, Hildersham, to an on-line furniture business without the need for planning permission highlighted the issue in South Cambridgeshire. CAMRA believes that no pub should be lost through change of use or through demolition without it first being subjected to the scrutiny of a planning system that allows the public to express their views. It has urged local authorities to use Article 4 Directions to bring this about. SCDC are consulting on doing just that. For more details please visit their webpage <https://www.scams.gov.uk/content/consultation-greater-protection-public-houses> There will also be some forms in the pubs or with the Clerk, they can be returned to Barton Post Office, please return by 20<sup>th</sup> February.

Although **we have no reason to think that either The Hoops or The White Horse are under any current threat**, the Campaign for Real Ale believes that pub losses should be regulated by the planning system and would urge you to make a submission to SCDC. Pubs can often be converted to shops, restaurants or offices without the need for planning permission. Nationally there has been a growing trend for pubs to be converted into supermarket convenience stores.

Next summer marks the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the end of World War II. In celebration of this important anniversary, Cambridgeshire County Council is pleased to announce a Small Grants Fund to encourage community activity.

It is an opportunity for communities to come together to remember the wartime effort, celebrate peace, reminisce about the ‘unforgettable forties’ era and capture some of the celebratory mood of the time. Whether it be a community tea dance, the researching and sharing of stories of the time, a lindy hop event, raising morale through music or sport, a ‘make do and mend’ community craft project, creating a ‘Dig For Victory’ garden or giving your fete or festival a forties theme, we would like you to design and deliver activities within your community that motivate and encourage people to get involved.

Small grants will be awarded to local groups and organisations to support community activities linked to and inspired by the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary, wartime Britain and the 1940’s era.

### ***Help protect yourself and your neighbours against telephone scams.***

We have seen an increase in scams in which the caller impersonates either a Police officer, a Fraud Officer or a bank employee, who fish for bank details or even offer to send someone round to collect their bank cards and any valuable items to ‘keep them safe’.

- Genuine banks, businesses or organisations will never telephone you and ask you to give out personal or financial details.
- This fraudulent caller may ask you to hang up and call your bank or police to prove they are genuine, but they don’t hang up, tricking you into thinking you are through to the genuine officer.
- To protect yourself, make sure you hear a dialling tone before you make your next call or phone a friend to check your call goes through before calling the number on the back of your bank card.
- Ask your telecoms provider to set up caller ID on your telephone so that you know who is calling your number before you decide to answer it.

- Register with the free Telephone Preference Service to reduce the number of unsolicited sales and marketing calls. Register on 0845 070 0707 or online.
- Be cautious and if in doubt, hang up.
