***Dear Friends,***

Michael Matthews has asked me to write the Magazine letter this month. I am happy to do so because I know how very busy he is trying to keep up with all the demands involved in the life of five churches and parishes as well as the added dimension of being Rural Dean covering nearly twenty more!

I don't know whether you saw the "Songs of Praise" programme on the 7<sup>th</sup> March. I was challenged by the middle-aged man who abstains from food from dawn to dusk each day of Lent, but then I thought of the millions of Muslims who do the same for their annual fast. It is a sign of really taking belief in God seriously. I wrote 'abstain' because fasting is, in fact, not going without food and drink but cutting down on the usual, as a sign of the season and reason for doing it. The heart of Jesus' life and ministry was self-sacrificial love for God and people. Christians need to mirror that somehow and, although fasting may not be everyone's calling, it remains a challenging and probably neglected way. And what for? Apart from reminding us of God's love in Christ, it is a way of increasing our communion with Him in prayer and thought. The result of that is more peace for our lives and a deeper joy in the celebration of Easter when we meet with Christ's conquering of all the suffering and the negative side of human nature called sin and are caught up in His unending life won for us. That this happens just when nature is bursting from the grave of winter is an added bonus!

I pray that we may share in this together and be a blessing for the rich and lovely community we live in.

### ***New highway fault reporting system to keep the customer at the wheel***

Cambridgeshire County Council has introduced a new interactive on-line reporting system for highway problems which will ensure the person reporting a fault is kept fully up to speed with its repair.

The Highways Reporting Project allows people to:

- Report a fault using a web-based mapping system to ensure the exact location is identified and notified to repair teams
- Check on-line to see if the fault has already been reported
- Let the customer go on-line to check progress on repair work
- Does away with the need for the public to use other reporting systems such as 'fixmystreet' which will save staff time and free up resources for road repair work

In addition people will still be able to report faults by telephone on 0345 045 5212

### ***Neighbourhood Watch***

At a recent meeting with the police, a number of points were made that I hope you will find useful.

1. Although criminals remain very active in our area, the general trend is down and has been for some time. The police say that this is partly due to neighbourhood groups identifying problems and communicating these to the police. So the more we help them, the more they can help us
2. There is general concern about speeding and inconsiderate parking in nearby villages. Action is being taken to address these two issues. In time, the proposed new speed limits in Barton should help to reduce the speeding problem
3. Metal theft is a very popular crime at present, particularly of lead and platinum (from catalytic converters). We are all advised to be careful where we park our vehicles, as thieves will think nothing about breaking into a vehicle to remove valuable metal
4. Power tools and lawnmowers are also popular with thieves. Please ensure that your shed is as secure as you can make it
5. Several villages have been targeted by oil thieves, and not just Barton. The police are doing what they can to reduce this form of crime. They recommend good strong locks will make it harder for the thieves.
