

Dear Friends,

I was out in my garden the other day, digging up weeds, cutting back brambles, pruning and turning over the soil, and it got me thinking. (I do not profess to be an expert in this field and I would certainly not say that I am a keen gardener!).

God spoke to me (usually he takes me by surprise!) about my life as a garden.

Was he asking me: What is the condition of the soil and what is growing in it, good and bad? Is anything growing at all? Is there anything that is producing fruit? The Bible talks about us being made up of body, mind, spirit and soul and I believe that the soil is the state of these different parts (Matthew 22:37, Mark 12:30, Luke 10:27). What do I put into these parts that bring nourishment? What do I let in that parches the soil and drains it of goodness?

Well, there are many brambles that need cutting back which are the most horrible things to deal with, being so thorny and unruly, and so long that often I can't see where they have actually taken root. Brambles don't make gardening easy and they need dealing with regularly, if not completely uprooted. What can be likened to brambles in my life? They are the things that have taken root, maybe years ago, which may be under control, but the roots are still there so there is the opportunity for them to grow and strangle and overshadow other life that is flourishing.

Then there are the Weeds. Oh the joy of weeding! Actually I must admit that I quite like it. But if they're left they just spread everywhere and before you know it the weeds have outnumbered the lovely plants and flowers that were growing quite happily. My grandma, an expert gardener, always told me that 20 minutes weeding a day does the job and keeps everything under control. Weeds are like the little foxes that the Bible talks about in Song of Songs 2:15, "Catch the foxes for us, the little foxes that are ruining the vineyards, while our vineyards are in blossom." Although we are born again into a new life with God this Easter we are still human and face the challenges that brings. So what are the weeds in our lives that need to be dealt with sometimes on a daily basis?

There was a lot to deal with when I was gardening and from my kitchen window it looked so overwhelming, but after a few solid hours outside, it was amazing what I accomplished. When we look at our lives and what needs dealing with or what needs some encouragement to grow, it can seem too much but then we do have the creator of the universe on our side and with him **ALL THINGS ARE POSSIBLE!** Can I encourage you to take a look at your life and think about what needs cutting back, what needs digging up and getting rid of completely and what needs attention so that it continues to grow and blossom to produce fruit. Finally, I want to encourage you to let the Holy Spirit to water your life to bring nourishment and new growth, and your garden of your life to blossom this Summer.
