

Dear Friends,

As many of us return to the daily routines of a new half-term, of work or of just living, after a period of breaks and of holidays. Many of us may already be thinking that it's nearly time for summer holidays, and making plans for them. Many of us will be looking for an escape from the pressures and demands of work and daily routines. "You need a holiday", we say to someone who is looking care-worn and harassed; "I need a holiday", we say when things are not going well and we're not giving of our best.

When I was at school, the final assembly of the school year always involved one of the local Vicars, saying in his droning pulpit-voice, "holidays are holy days". There is, of course, a profound truth in that comment, for many of our public holidays were originally religious festivals, and the Bible recognizes our need for time out: relaxation and refreshment are essential to healthy human living. The Old Testament has a double rhythm of holidays – a yearly cycle of festivals, and the weekly cycle of six working days followed by a day set apart for rest, relaxation and worship.

There is a profound perception of basic human needs here. We need variety in the fundamental routines of life – work, leisure, hobbies and rest. But we also need something that takes us out of ourselves, lifts us up, and renews our vision of the purpose and goal of all our efforts. To make one day a week different, and to dedicate it to such ends, is important for nurturing and renewing us.

This is why the observance of a Sunday is so important to most Christians. To sanctify one day to God helps us to serve Him every day; to come together in worship on one day sets the tone and the priorities for the following week. To lift up our hearts to God in worship renews our vision of what really matters in life, and gives us joy and strength for all that lies ahead. I am greatly encouraged by the people who say to me, "If I don't go to church on Sunday, the whole week seems out of joint", or just "I seem to have missed out on something!"

Sunday is not a kill-joy day, but a weekly holy-day, to refresh us and set us on the right track for the coming days.

Why not try it? Enjoy your summer holidays, wherever they take you – then come and share our weekly holiday with God, which we enjoy every Sunday morning in church.

Parish Jottings

Emergency Planning – Lawrence Green, the South Cambs Safety Advisor & Emergency Planning Officer, encouraged us to look at our current emergency procedures, to identify which hazards might occur and how to help ourselves to recover or get back to normality. Would there be retired nurses or doctors who could help? We will be updating our plan following a proposed structure, so any suggestions are most welcome.

Speed: They listened, but they didn't listen!

The Clerk put over Barton and Grantchester's view and petition at the County Cabinet meeting on 24th May, Fiona Whelan also spoke ably on our behalf. The Chairman was there to support, there were various contributions from County Councillors and some rather vague comments from officers.

Basically the feeling was that they gave a semblance of democracy, but really they were most interested in safeguarding their policies and their officers.

After 45 minutes they took a cursory vote accepting their own recommendations en bloc and moved on. They added a recommendation about finding out if easy payments would be possible for smaller parishes (not Barton).

“Invite Barton, Longstowe, Stapleford/Sawston and Tadlow Parish Councils to consider funding a reduction in the speed limit in or on the approaches to their settlements, in light of recent policy changes relating to speed limits in villages and settlements”.

Should you feel very strongly, and I am sure you do, you can contact the Cabinet Member for Highways and Access, Steve.criswell[at]cambridgeshire.gov.uk 699173.

The Parish Council will be doing so, to establish the exact costs of lowering our speed limits by 10mph.

The County Council Leader Cllr. Clarke stated: “We want to have a simple, clearly expressed policy, keep the highways moving, we must listen to local people, who can then choose to pay for limits.”

With regard to speed Fiona commented that she had been surprised that the Safer Routes to School Scheme had not been considered, there was probably not a great cost difference between 50 and 40mph limits, we await the actual costs.

We must fight for Comberton Library to have some evening opening hours.

She hopes that Cambs CC will decide to open a new secondary school in Cambourne in September 2013, so alleviating pressure on Comberton VC.

Speed limit stickers on bins – We will be ordering these for you to place on your bins, an effective way of reminding drivers about speed.

Diamond Jubilee – Do you have some ideas on how the village could mark or celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee in June 2012? Please come along to a meeting on **Monday 4th July at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.**

Hedges alongside footpaths and pavements – Please make sure that hedges alongside public footpaths are closely trimmed. This helps people with walking difficulty or mothers with prams so much. Thank you in advance.

Councillors' walkabout, Tuesday 2nd August at 6pm – Councillors are likely to be walking around the village that evening. If you want them to look at something in

particular, please ask.

Parking on pavements – A reminder to yourselves and your visitors that you should not be parking on pavements anywhere in the village, as it is both illegal and makes life difficult for those with mobility problems.
