Cambridge City Food Bank – Can you help to provide food? Just a reminder!

Barton Baptist Church will be open for donations of food on the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays 7.30pm to 8.30pm and the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays 2.30pm to 4pm each month. So in February that will be 1st and 15th, Wednesday evenings and 14th and 28th Tuesday afternoons. A container will be placed just inside the front door. The food collected will be taken to the food bank store and sorted.

Food required (nothing perishable): Tins – Tomatoes, Sponge pudding, Rice pudding, Meat, Fish, Fruit and Vegetables. Milk (UHT or Powdered), Sugar (500g), Fruit juice, Soup (packet or tinned), Pasta sauces, Cereals, Tea bags, Instant coffee, Mashed potato, Rice, Pasta, Jam, Biscuits and snack bars.

There may be some hope of restoring the Friday evening no.18 bus service.

District Councillor Francis Burkitt is Chair of the Corporate Governance Committee at SCDC and handed out a new plain English version of “What we do, and how we spend your money doing it”, most spending goes on salaries, without which services cannot be provided; SCDC still has the thirteenth lowest council tax of shire authorities.

Happy New Year to you from all of us here at Barton. Last term came and went with the usual Autumn Term activities. It was lovely to see many of you at our Christmas Fayre, one of the best turn outs we have had in ages. Class 1 and 2 treated us to a wonderful production of 'Mary's Knitting', a re-telling of the nativity story through song, drama and the usual humour that the little ones provide. I am always so proud of their confidence as they perform to a large audience. Classes 3 and 4 delighted us with their telling of the Christmas Story at our Epiphany Carol Service, just last week, again singing brilliantly and reading clearly. Father Christmas came to visit, we had our Christmas Lunch and on the

last day enjoyed a performance of The Snowman given to us by a group from the University of Cambridge, a lovely way to end the term.

One of the highlights of the last week of term was a video link up with a Grade 5 (Y6) class at St Marguerite's Catholic School, in Spruce Grove, near Edmonton in Alberta, Canada. Class 4 stayed behind after school to talk to the children, who due to the time difference were at the start of their day, via a Skype-type video link. Both groups shared their preparations for Christmas, realising that some things, such as Advent wreaths, were similar the world over. However, our Canadian counterparts, who showed us their beautiful Yule logs made from real logs and holly etc, were intrigued when we told them that we couldn't show them ours because they had eaten them!! I then had to explain that ours had been made from a Swiss roll covered in chocolate icing! We also explained our Christingle to them and I think they are keen to do something similar next year!

This term the children are already into their new IPC themes. Classes 1 and 2 are looking at 'The Things People Do', Class 3, 'Significant People', and Class 4, 'They see the World like this'. All of the groups have an entry point activity to introduce the theme and this week Classes 1 and 2 are inviting a variety of adults in to talk to them about their jobs, Class 3 are having an historical 'catwalk' when the children have got to come dressed as a 'significant' person, with clues to their identity, and Class 4 are taking a trip into Cambridge to look at, sketch and take pictures of the various architectural styles in the city. A very busy term!

And finally ... we are proud to be one of only four schools in the county that hold the Bronze accreditation for our School Travel Plan, following our involvement in the Safer Routes to School Project.
