# Churchyard

Our churchyard has for many years attracted appreciative comments from visitors and parishioners alike about how tidy and well cared for it looks. This is thanks to the volunteers who mow a section of the grass regularly through the summer. This year we have 'lost' three of our regular mowers and are struggling to keep up this 'neat and cared for look'. If anyone would be willing to cut a small area of the grass please get in touch with Hugh Greenfield or John Flint. (A church mowing machine is available) We would be most grateful to hear from you.

# Church Organ

Having had a number of problems with our church organ over a two year period when it suddenly developed faults, leaving it unusable until fixed, the PCC commissioned reports from three firms. Messrs. Holmes and Swift, organ builders, gave the most comprehensive report which states that records show that the organ was built by A.T. Miller in 1869 and its mechanism and pipework are completely original. The organ is essentially in good order; however the 'key action' – the mechanical linkage system – has become worn, leading to sticking notes, failure of one pedal function and the pedal linkages becoming very slack in operation. In addition the pipes – 40 in – total are choked with dirt and dust which is deadening their tone and affecting the tuning.

Their recommendation is for complete 'Historic Restoration' which would restore the organ to 'as new' whilst retaining its authenticity. It would, in their opinion, be good for another 100 years use with proper maintenance and have a value in excess of £100,000.

The cost of the restoration project is £23,560 + VAT. We have already been successful in obtaining a grant of £5,500 towards the cost and will be seeking further grant aid. We are very anxious to progress this project to ensure that the organ is 'fit for purpose' for our use and for future generations. We are therefore appealing for donations to enable the project to go forward as soon as possible. Please send any donations to Mrs Erica Bithell (PCC Treasurer) at 4, Kings Grove, Barton. # **County Councillor Stephen Frost**

At the June meeting Stephen explained that the Cabinet system will remain until May 2014, but the lack of a Conservative overall majority will mean that independents and other parties will have a greater say through the Committee system after that. He was keen to bring improvements to the A14 to allow development of Northstowe and so relieve pressure for housing in our villages. <a href="majority-special-special-system-number-1954">spfrost@tory.org 01954 211444</a>

**South Cambridgeshire Local Plan** SCDC has considered all the comments received during both Issues and Options consultations and prepared a draft plan. Local items of interest are: **Comberton** moves up from Group village to Minor Rural Centre reflecting its level of service provision, particularly

the presence of secondary education. Sites allocated for housing include Comberton (in Toft Parish) – land at Bennell Farm – 90 homes with football pitch and changing facilities, and car parking for Comberton Village College, with affordable housing provision.

**Community Stadium** – The Council with Cambridge City Council has made the judgement that the need has not been demonstrated sufficiently to provide exceptional circumstances for a review of the Green Belt.

The current adopted **Proposals Map** has been revised to include all the new site specific proposals included in the draft Local Plan such as housing allocations; changes to the Green Belt boundary, changes to village framework boundaries; and all the designated local green spaces. You will have an opportunity to comment on the draft Local Plan during further **public consultation** this summer which is anticipated to run from **19**<sup>th</sup> **July until 30**<sup>th</sup> **September 2013**. Some of these **exhibitions** are joint ones with Cambridge City Council (marked\*). # The Leys Project

The Leys Project as outlined in the June magazine remains on track. So far, eight contractors have quoted for different aspects of the four parts of the scheme: paths, field parking, lights and fences. After selecting the best quotes and making a contingency allowance, the total scheme now comes in at nearly £50,000. The District Council Community Chest has given £1,000 and there is further from our own Parish Council, but for the 10% contributory third-party funding we have to find some £5,000 locally: from user groups and other donors. Should you feel moved to help with a donation, it should be to 'Barton Parish Council' and via the Clerk or any Councillor. We are unlikely to hear the results of our two major grant applications until mid-August, so the earliest we can start on the ground is in September. Hopefully though, the weather then will be good for construction work.

#### What is a BeaVer?

Answer: a Barton Volunteer or BV for short; one of a loose-knit group who gnaw away at practical tasks to maintain or enhance public spaces in Barton. Here are a few examples:

MF cuts the grass paths in CC, where other plants are cared for by VW, BP and WJ, who is also very good at removing old tree guards which are no longer needed.

RN does a regular Sunday morning litter-pick on parts of New and

Cambridge Roads. PS and JB have been seen on various pruning, hedging and fencing tasks, or putting in cycle racks. If it is a wood repair job, then KB is our man.

Most of our memorial seats and now bus shelters are receiving attention from the brushed hand of SC. There are also many, like LM, who on walks around the village will pick up litter or snip back encroaching brambles.

This varied crew dance loosely to the tune called by the PC under whose authority they BV and to which goes a monthly report entitled BeaVers and Minor Works. Councillors, of course, also volunteer, on the Recreation Ground and elsewhere, as do committee members of the VH and the NP who help maintain those important facilities.

Then there are those who cut grass regularly in the church yard (vacancies still, I believe). Others will have served occasionally, like folk who helped put in the 30+ wayside benches scattered around the parish. Perhaps you are un-initialled here, but you know who you are.

If you are recently retired, or otherwise, and **would like to get more involved** in caring for your public patch, please be encouraged: perhaps have a preliminary word with any PC member.

**So 'bravo' all BVs.** If you see one at work, give a word of encouragement, or a toot on the horn, and a thank you to all who contribute in any way to the life of this vital village.
