### **Parish Jottings**

**County Councillor Stephen Frost** explained that the County Council had come to a favourable settlement with BAM Nuttall over the costs of the Guided Busway from St. Ives to Trumpington. However, in response to a parishioner, he said that there would inevitably be a modest contribution to this project in future County rate demands.

With regard to housing he was conscious that any development at Bourn Airfield would require the County, which is responsible for highways, to improve A428 links with the A14 and M11.

**District Councillor Francis Burkitt** reminded us that the consultation about the **South Cambridgeshire Local Plan** runs until 14<sup>th</sup> October 2013. [www.scambs.gov.uk](http://www.scambs.gov.uk) There is some development proposed for Comberton and at Bourn Airfield, but no nearer.

New houses would definitely be built, often on brownfield sites; therefore it would be prudent for the Quarter to Six Quadrant villages to liaise and act in preparation for any future planning issues.

### **The Leys Project**

We are unable to see any progress on the ground until grant funding decisions are taken. We expect to hear in mid-October concerning the parking area, but that on the path renewal will not be until late November. Work will then be rather dependent on the weather.

**Stoptober** – the 28-day national stop smoking challenge – is set to return following its launch in October 2012. Stopping smoking for 28 days means you're five times more likely to stop for good and last year over 160,000 people successfully quit in the nation's biggest mass participation stop smoking challenge ever. Connecting Cambridgeshire is on track to deliver **superfast broadband** to over 90% of homes and businesses across Cambridgeshire and Peterborough with better broadband of between 2Mbps and 24Mbps for very nearly 100% of premises by the end of 2015.

### **Sales of the Edited Register of Electors by South Cambs.**

By law the edited register must be made available for purchase from the Council by any individual or organisation. The cost of the register is also prescribed in legislation. Unfortunately, since there are no restrictions as to how the information can be used, it could potentially be used for direct marketing purposes.

Linked to this, the annual canvass of electors is going to be later than usual this year, with initial forms going out in October. Unfortunately, it is no longer allowed to ‘carry over’ an elector’s choice to opt out of appearing on the edited register. **This means that if you wish to opt out, you must tell us again even if you have told us in a previous year.**

### **County Council settles dispute with Guided Busway contractor**

A lengthy dispute over costs has been settled with contractor BAM Nuttall. The settlement means the Council will have paid BAM Nuttall £84.7 million to build the Busway against an original quotation of £83.9 million.

Around £126 million had been budgeted to pay for the whole Busway scheme – including construction and other costs such as land acquisitions. Some £92.5 million of this money was provided by Government with another £26 million of section 106 monies from developers and the rest in transport grants and other income.

Due to the legal process and the time taken to reach a settlement with BAM

Nuttall, the cost of the scheme has risen – mainly due to the level of legal fees the Council has had to incur in order to fight the case.

This means the total cost of the Busway, including land and staffing costs, as well as interest, is £152 million. Already the Council has found and paid £17.8 million of that gap with £8 million to find. This payment will be spread over 25 years through the capital budget.

Since it opened in August 2011 the Busway has proven very popular with passengers, with 5.6 million journeys made, well above expected levels, helping to reduce traffic on the parallel section of the A14.

## **Neighbourhood Watch**

I attended the Cambridgeshire Neighbourhood Watch AGM on your behalf recently, at the police HQ in Hinchingsbrooke. There was good news on crime rates, which are falling despite the problems caused by government spending cuts. The Cambridgeshire police budget has been cut from £130m to £100m a year and the force has had to restructure as a result, with many staff cuts. There have been 8% fewer crimes, and 10% fewer violent crimes, in the county since April 2011. The police wish to cut the crime rate further, and are grateful to the public for reporting crime and suspicious activity and acting as their ‘eyes and ears’.

I was asked to publicise the Bobby scheme. This is a local charity, supported by Cambridgeshire Constabulary, that provides a free service to victims of burglary, aged 65 or over, by providing home security such as locks, bolts, peepholes, door chains and alarms etc. This service is also available to anyone over the age of 85. They do not aim to turn a home into a fortress but they will provide practical help, reassurance and peace of mind. They can be contacted on 07866 602100.

Recorded crime in Barton remains relatively low, but there have been a number of burglaries here recently, especially to sheds and commercial premises, so please be vigilant.

### **Quarter-to-Six Quadrant Oil Club – save money on bulk orders**

We've recently extended the Club to the entire QTSQ area, but the simple process is still the same: Agricole will bulk-up your order for home heating oil with all of their other customers who order at the same time, so that you can benefit from a shared volume discount and the best competitive price from a range of suppliers on the day. There are two ways to order:

- (1) order any time for delivery within 2-3 days. This gets you a normal discount, as your order will be bulked-up with all the other people who order on that day; or
- (2) order in the last week of a month, to join the month-end scheme, for delivery by the 7<sup>th</sup> of the next month. This gets a bigger discount, as more people target this time of the month, so the volume of orders is bigger, and hence the discount is bigger.

You don't have to pay to join the club, and there is no membership paperwork. It's administered for us by a broker called Agricole Oil ([www.agricoleoil.co.uk](http://www.agricoleoil.co.uk)), based in Cambourne and run by Jeremy Cole and his colleagues. **Trading Standards – Is renewable energy for you?**

The Energy Saving Trust ([www.energysavingtrust.org.uk](http://www.energysavingtrust.org.uk)) is a good place to find information and advice. They also have a helpline: 0300 1231234

If you aren't able to pay for improvements up front, you could consider the Government's Green Deal Scheme ([www.gov.uk/green-deal-energy-saving-measures](http://www.gov.uk/green-deal-energy-saving-measures)) which allows for repayment over a period of time through your energy bills. Note that Green Deal debt attaches to the property, so if you sell it, your buyer will have to take over the debt. If you need advice on finance options, your local Citizens Advice Bureau will be able to help you.

Green Deal has its own approved assessors and installers, but in general, we recommend installers and products in the Micro Generation Certification Scheme (MCS) or are Renewable Energy Assurance Limited (REAL) approved. Some members also sit on our Buy With Confidence approved trader scheme giving you even greater assurance that they are businesses you can trust. As always, we recommend getting three quotations to ensure the installation price and projections are reasonable, and check the terms and conditions carefully before agreeing to anything.
