

Dear Friends,

We had a holiday in the Lake District after Easter and explored the beautiful landscapes with the help of Beatrix Potter's entrancing stories. We searched for Mrs Tigglywinkle on the (side) of Cat Bells, and said hello to a real-life Squirrel Nutkin every day as he made his run from the wood at the back of the house through the garden where we were staying. Benedict was sure he found the tree where Peter Rabbit lived in his burrow, and Minty enjoyed waving to Owl Island, keenly looking for Old Brown as we drove along the banks of Grasmere Water each day.

I love listening to people's stories as much as I do sharing my own! We can learn so much about one another as we do. Jesus, who was rather good at telling stories (or parables) himself, encounters a couple of disciples on the road to Emmaus shortly after his death. The disciples, unrecognising Jesus accompanying them and thinking of him as a stranger, tell the anonymous traveller their story. It was a story of disappointment, grief and confusion as they recall Jesus' death, and subsequent confusing stories of a possible resurrection. As the disciples reach their destination they invite their new friend into their home and it is only when Jesus breaks the bread set before him by his host, do they see Jesus before them and realise he is in their midst.

One of my favourite short verses found in the book of Hebrews in the Bible is this: 'Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it.'

Being generous to listen to one another, sharing our stories and offering hospitality is an important way for communities (and churches) to flourish. It's harder of course when we don't feel our stories are heard or are unimportant, but all our different voices must be given room to be heard. That's where the generosity comes in.

Whether your story right now is one of daring and adventure like Peter Rabbit, or one of despair like those disciples on the road to Emmaus, or one of joy that summer has finally arrived; I pray that you might dare to believe that your story is worth telling, and other people's stories are worth listening to. For they may change us in a way that changes us forever. Where do you need to hear someone's story, where can you give someone the space to tell their story and where are you being asked to share your story?

I'd like to commend to you our series of lectures 'Life Matters' that continue this month at St Peter's Barton, people from different contexts sharing their stories.

We hope you enjoy them!

Parish Jottings

Hello, these are my first Parish Jottings as the new Clerk and apologies for the brevity but I have been working hard to get to grips with all the aspects the role entails. I hope there are items of interest.

Elections

The local elections took place on May 3rd and we have six new Parish Councillors (out of nine) and we can offer congratulations to them and best wishes in pursuit of the varied tasks the position encompasses. Details are on the village website <http://www.barton-cambs.org.uk> The District Council Elections result means we have three LibDem Councillors in our Ward and whilst Ian Sollom will be the principal contact for Barton the Councillors are keen to emphasise their 'team' approach to matters in the Ward.

Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) www.greatercambridge.org.uk

The situation regarding the busway may change dramatically following the Lib Dems considerable success in the District Council elections. Before the election, the Conservatives had 36 seats and the Lib Dems 14. Now the figures are 11 and 30, giving the Lib Dems a powerful controlling position. Peter Topping has been replaced as leader by Bridget Smith. The Lib Dems have been vocal opponents of the busway and will be able to fight it more forcefully now.

Separately, Mayor James Palmer, who heads up the Combined Authority, has recently confirmed his opposition also. He tweeted:

"My opposition to busways has been made clear many times on social and printed media. Any suggestion otherwise is total nonsense. The GCP cannot

deliver busways without my vote and I will not support them. The GCP do not have the power to set a transport strategy. The Combined Authority is the transport authority and the GCP have to report to the CA.”

It would appear that a light rail system, with a hub at an all-ways Girton Interchange will receive greater promotion as a long-term solution to the proposed busway.

Neighbourhood Watch

Home Office crime figures for March show that there were 5 crimes in Barton that month - 2 cases of criminal damage, 1 theft from a car, 1 public order offence and 1 theft from a person. Since then, police reports have been sparse, which seems encouraging. There was a theft from a car in April and there has been a break-in at CRT in May (a regular occurrence sadly).

Due to the impending departure of Bev Edwards, Barton needs a new Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator. It isn't onerous but can help in the fight against crime as it gives us a good channel of communication with the police and with other Neighbourhood Watches in the region. I'm requesting that villagers should contact a Parish Councillor or myself if they would like to volunteer to fill this important role.

Our May speaker, Dr Maureen James, gave us a light-hearted but comprehensive glimpse of the omens and superstitions prevalent in the Fens over many generations. Many of these are found in other cultures, such as the custom of greeting a solitary magpie or hanging a home-made pendulum over a pregnant woman's bump to discover the sex of the baby. Others appear special to the Fens, such as moles' feet rather than rabbits' feet being used as a good-luck charm and the possession of a grey goose feather to signify membership of a secret brotherhood. The Fenlanders had little belief in "wee folk" but witches featured largely in their culture. There were multiple charms for protection against them and shooting a hare was taboo as it might be a witch in disguise. Recording all these rituals and customs is very important, as the pressures of modern life are rapidly stifling them.

In April, our Speaker was Sarah Massie who told us about Mindfulness for wellbeing. Mindfulness is used in teaching, the prison service, the workplace and the health service as a therapeutic intervention where it can be used as stress relief or as cognitive therapy in the treatment phobias, eating disorders and PTSD and many other conditions. It is used in healthcare for pain control, and in psychiatric and degenerative conditions. In teaching and the prison service it is used as a way of dealing with stress and behaviour problems in pupils/inmates. Mindfulness involves concentrating on the present and paying attention to ourselves – Head, heart and body. This reduces the amount of adrenaline we produce in times of stress during the fight/flight response.

Barton Wildlife Group

The Offords kindly allowed us to revisit the orchard, once the weather had warmed up, a group of us returned on April 26th. Many of the trees were now in bloom, and while the orchard was not exactly buzzing with bees, we had a successful visit, and saw our first swallow. Sadly the Mistle Thrush nest was empty, suggesting that the thrushes had been unable to defend the nest against the crows, which had had been very interested when we visited the first time.

Over the two visits, we observed and identified 60 different species, including 22 different birds, 19 plants in flower, 6 different bumble bees, honey bees and other insect species, in addition to fungi, lichens and common mammals. Our younger visitors became adept at spotting and netting the queen bees, for our resident experts to identify, while explaining the specific features to look for in separating out "Bumble Bees" into individual species.

At the time of writing, the next meetings are scheduled for 30th May, when our main focus will be Flowers and Insects. As the weather brightens up and the sunshine starts brightening our weeks, we welcome the longer, brighter nights and the opportunity to enjoy summer days and nights in the garden.

When powering up your BBQ's and putting out the garden furniture for the summer season, be sure to take note of our top tips below to ensure you have a fun and safe summer in the garden.

- If cooking outdoors, always check barbeques over after winter storage, keep them on level ground and ensure they are sited away from sheds, fences, overhanging foliage and property
- Keep children and garden games well away from the cooking area and never leave the barbecue unattended
- When out in the countryside, extinguish cigarettes properly and dispose of them responsibly – never throw a lit cigarette into a field or wooded area.
- Don't forget to stay safe around our county's waterways and if you see someone in trouble in water, call 999 immediately with clear details of your location
- When out camping or using a tent, never use candles inside or nearby and always discourage smoking nearby. Never cook inside a tent.
