

Dear Friends,

We are looking forward to celebrating Easter at St Peter's on the 21st April 9.30am. As ever, all are welcome as we gather to celebrate. Through a wide range of services and activities reflecting different aspects of the Easter story we will celebrate with other churches locally, and across our Lordsbridge Team of Churches to which we belong. We will be remembering the last supper as we gather on Maundy Thursday and share Holy Communion together, we will also pause to pray at a number of churches when we carry the cross on Good Friday for a walk of witness - we begin in Barton at 1pm this year - then on to the joy of Easter Sunday as we celebrate on Easter Sunday.

What these services represent of course is the retelling of the story of Jesus' last days, as he gathered with his disciples to have one last meal, encouraging them never to stop meeting and sharing together - to the pain and agony of Jesus crucified on the cross on what is now known as Good Friday. His death, an act of sacrifice of God himself upon the cross in the person of Jesus reconciling us back to himself, only makes sense when Sunday comes. Risen, Jesus stands alive, conquering death - and we gather in joy on Easter Sunday to celebrate that love wins, trusting again in the hope offered to each one of us through the saving act of the cross.

Barton Baptist Church News

Are you a film buff? Did you watch the recent Bafta Awards? I'm neither, but a few weeks ago I was at a loss on what to watch for a few minutes before the 10 o'clock news, so I flicked through the channels and ended up on this awards ceremony. I'm sure you know the formula - incredulous winners, over-the-top compliments, crying, hugging and lots of 'Thank you's! I'm sure it must be the most wonderful ceremony if one is given an award but awfully dull if not. Anyway, the EE Rising Star Award was announced and onto the stage came a young (25yrs) British-Guyanese actress called Letitia Wright. I particularly like her name as one of my daughters has Letitia as a middle name! You might know her from a very popular film called "Black Panther." She played a character called Shuri. Then for the next few minutes this actress opened her heart and shared her faith, she thanked the Lord for her many blessings, she thanked Him for looking after her and she put her success down to God. Wow! I couldn't believe what I was hearing. For a few moments the cameras flipped to the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge who were sitting in the front row. They couldn't disguise that expression which shows, awkwardness, discomfort, embarrassment and surprise all rolled into one! Do you know that face? I tried to analyse why I was so surprised and to be honest so proud of Letitia. I concluded: Firstly, there probably aren't many actors who are Christians, Secondly, it isn't cool or politically correct to identify with one particular faith and certainly not appropriate to talk about it, Thirdly, how many people would put their success down to God and then speak about it? and fourthly, how many young actors would threaten any future work by sharing their faith in front of a TV audience of millions? It pulled me up fast. How often am I prepared to share my own personal faith? How often do I avoid the subject in case I experience that particular "look"? Am I prepared to take a stance which might affect my job? In the Bible there are many incidences where people were not prepared to stand up for Jesus. The most obvious one is where Peter denounces the Lord three times. We are told "Then Peter remembered the word the Lord had spoken to him, "before the cock crows today, you will disown me three times". He went outside and wept bitterly." A little later his Lord was crucified. As Easter approaches I pray that I will learn from Letitia's braveness and determination to tell others about God. I pray too that Barton Baptist will continue to be a Christian presence in the village of Barton as it has for over 100 years.

Parish Jottings

Annual Parish Meeting

Firstly, notice that the Annual Parish Meeting will be on Tuesday April 30th Village Hall 7:15 for 7:30. The **Annual Parish Meeting** is not a **Council meeting**, but rather is a **meeting** of local government electors registered for the area for which it is held. It must be held between 1st March and 1st June. The purpose of the meeting is so that the Parish Council can explain what it has been doing over the last year, present future intentions and it enables the electors to meet their Councillors and have the chance to ask questions. Exact format of the meeting and the Agenda will be published asap.

Parish Council meetings and Working Groups

At the February PC meeting and after reasoned debate and a great deal of reflection, the decision was taken and the resolution passed to change the frequency of the PC meetings to bi-monthly. It represented a collective feeling that the amount of issues to discuss at an agenda driven PC meeting is not conducive to effective management, planning and decision making. In conjunction with this a resolution to set up 4 working groups (Governance and Finance, Highways Travel and Traffic, Village amenities and Open Spaces and Communications and Community Engagement) was passed unanimously. The intention is that between PC meetings the WG's can formulate action plans and responses and hopefully participate in greater community engagement to assist the reporting procedure. The WG's cannot take decisions but their recommendations will then be discussed and hopefully resolved at the relevant future PC meeting. A tracking system of progress made will be available to each group. The intention is for the Clerk to monitor this. In addition, any urgent matters or issues raised by residents will be collated and communicated by the Clerk for action. Should it be necessary the PC can call another meeting.

Accordingly the PC meetings calendar under the new regime is below:

No PC in April but by law have to hold the Annual Parish Meeting. This will be on 30th April, PC Meeting May 7th (1st meeting of new year), No June, PC July 2nd, no august, PC Sept 3rd, no oct, PC Nov 5th, no December, PC Jan 7th 2020, no Feb, PC March 3rd.

SPEEDING and TRAFFIC CALMING in the Village

As Parish Clerk and on behalf of residents who have engaged with the PC, I have approached Cambridge Police to say that Barton Parish Council wish to run a Speedwatch group (again) to help with speeding issues in the community and to compile statistics to be used in discussions with the County Council Highways department. In particular there are concerns regarding Haslingfield Road, New

Road, Comberton Road, A603 Wimpole Road. So far I have 11 volunteers, if you would like to help please let me know ASAP via ian.minto@bartonvillage.org
In order to participate, volunteers need to be trained in the strict protocols that are relevant via community training organised by the Police. Attendance at one training session is required. The upcoming training session is at Cambourne Police Station 30/3 from 10.00-11.30. Please contact me and I can pre-book.

Height Restriction Barrier

The Council have resolved to install a height restriction barrier on the Recreation Ground and it should be installed late March/April. The procedures for locking/unlocking will be published but in meantime please contact ian.minto@bartonvillage.org if you have any thoughts.

Barton WI

After a short Annual Meeting our March speaker, Jean Lawrence, supported by her husband, Gerry, and dog, Dino, told us about "Hearing Dogs for Deaf People". The most commonly used breeds are spaniels, labradors and poodles. The charity itself breeds about half of the dogs it trains. Training costs about £25,000 per dog and support during its working life amounts to around £15,000. "Hearing dogs" normally retire at about 11 and, if possible, remain with the person they have supported. Not all dogs can reach the exacting standards of a

fully qualified "hearing dog" but there are valuable supporting roles for the less qualified. The most intelligent dogs can help with people/dog assessments and matching or support people who are not only deaf but disabled in some other way. Jean emphasised the role played by the huge army of volunteers who support the charity at every stage of its processes and, to illustrate the fact that a "hearing dog" can offer its human partner independence, confidence, companionship and fun, Jean told us the history of three partnerships, including her own very emotive story. To raise money for the charity, Jean and Gerry sold beautiful wood-turned items they make themselves.

At our April meeting Rob Marsden will speak about "Liquid Gold" aka olive oil. We are holding another Jigsaw Challenge on Tuesday 16th April at 7.00pm in the Village Hall. Make up your own team of four or come alone and we will try to assemble teams. The cost will be £5.

April is a good time to sow wildflowers in your garden. This spring I am planning to turn a few square yards of my lawn into a wildflower patch. Apart from garden centres, there are plenty of websites where you can buy a packets of wild plant seeds, including a range of annuals, perennials and grasses. Other great sources of

nectar are some of the herbs, such as thyme, marjoram (great for ground cover) and fennel, which provide food for bees, hoverflies (natural predators of aphids) and other insects.

Bees and butterflies have been already been spotted earlier than usual this year: buff-tailed bumble bees, brimstone, comma and holly blue butterflies in early March. But now is the time to keep an eye out for the first arrival of summer-visiting birds such as swallows, house martins, willow warblers and chiffchaffs. It would be lovely to hear of your sightings.
